To City of Rockville Admin,

This is concerning the Hansen letter of credit.

I am requesting to be put on the council agenda in Jan. 2011 to discuss this issue in detail and come to some resolve.

Due to circumstances the wetland restoration project has been aborted. Originally the project was for extraction of 110,000 cubic yards of gravel to be removed prior to creating a wetland from this site. As of this date only 10000 cubic yards have been crushed, of that there remains 1000 cubic yards remaining on a pile at the site. This accounts to approximately 11% of the projects total amount of extraction of gravel from this site.

The letter of credit was written for \$50000 for road damage and \$25000 for reclamation of the site. Reclamation has been completed, except that portion that has the pile of crushed gravel on it. I left extra amount of black dirt around this area to be leveled when the gravel is removed.

This next spring a local farmer will put this whole site to an agricultural use i.e. corn, soybean, wheat etc. and every year thereafter.

I did not want to waste the crushed gravel that is why it is still there.

Would the city be interested in this gravel at my cost which is \$2.00/cubic yard?


The pile can remain there for one complete year at no cost to the city.

In return the city of Rockville releases me from the letter of credit as of this date Jan 19th 2011.

The largest buyer for this gravel has been the City of Rockville, then removal by theft, then other citizens of Rockville.

Due to other traffic on 230th st. and the fact I only removed 11% of the original amount of gravel, I feel that dropping the letter of credit at this time is the right procedure.
